HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

Thank you for purchasing Wonder: A Picture Advent Book. We hope this can help you restore wonder this Christmas season, as we contemplate together on the different aspects surrounding Christ's birth two thousand years ago.

The reason we prepared this book is simple: we realize that not everyone might have the extra time during this busy season to read through several pages of an advent book together as a family—even though many of us might greatly desire to carve out that time to make the season more meaningful. We hope that by creating a more visual advent book, we can help more families take even just a few minutes each day to remember the reason for Christmas: God's love for us expressed in the coming of His Son Jesus Christ, who then gave up His life for us to be restored back to Him.

We want to keep this simple. We have prepared one artwork for each day of this advent book, with the title and artist's name, along with the corresponding Bible passages that served as the basis or inspiration for the artwork.

You may just use it as a PDF on a tablet or laptop, or decide to print the pages.

If you decide to print:

You may print the entire book out as a book to leaf through together, although it's only good for 20 days, and we would recommend printing the pages on cardstock so you can preserve the pages for a longer time.

For printing, this is in 8.5” x 11” landscape format.

If you intend to read it as a book, make sure that odd-numbered pages are on the right side so you can view the pictures on the left while you read the right side. For back to back printing and using the picture cards separately, print the even-numbered pages on front, the odd numbers on the back.

After you finish going through the devotional, you may also cut the paintings out for displaying around your home.

How to use as a devotional:

The Bible passages trace the Christmas story over twenty days. You may read through the Bible passage while looking at the artwork together. You might want to make observations about the things you see in the artwork. That’s it. Whether or not you end up with discussions about the scene or the story, it depends on your family.

We hope this can add even just a little bit of wonder back as you celebrate Christmas this year. Merry Christmas!

The silent Word is pleading. [Chorus]*

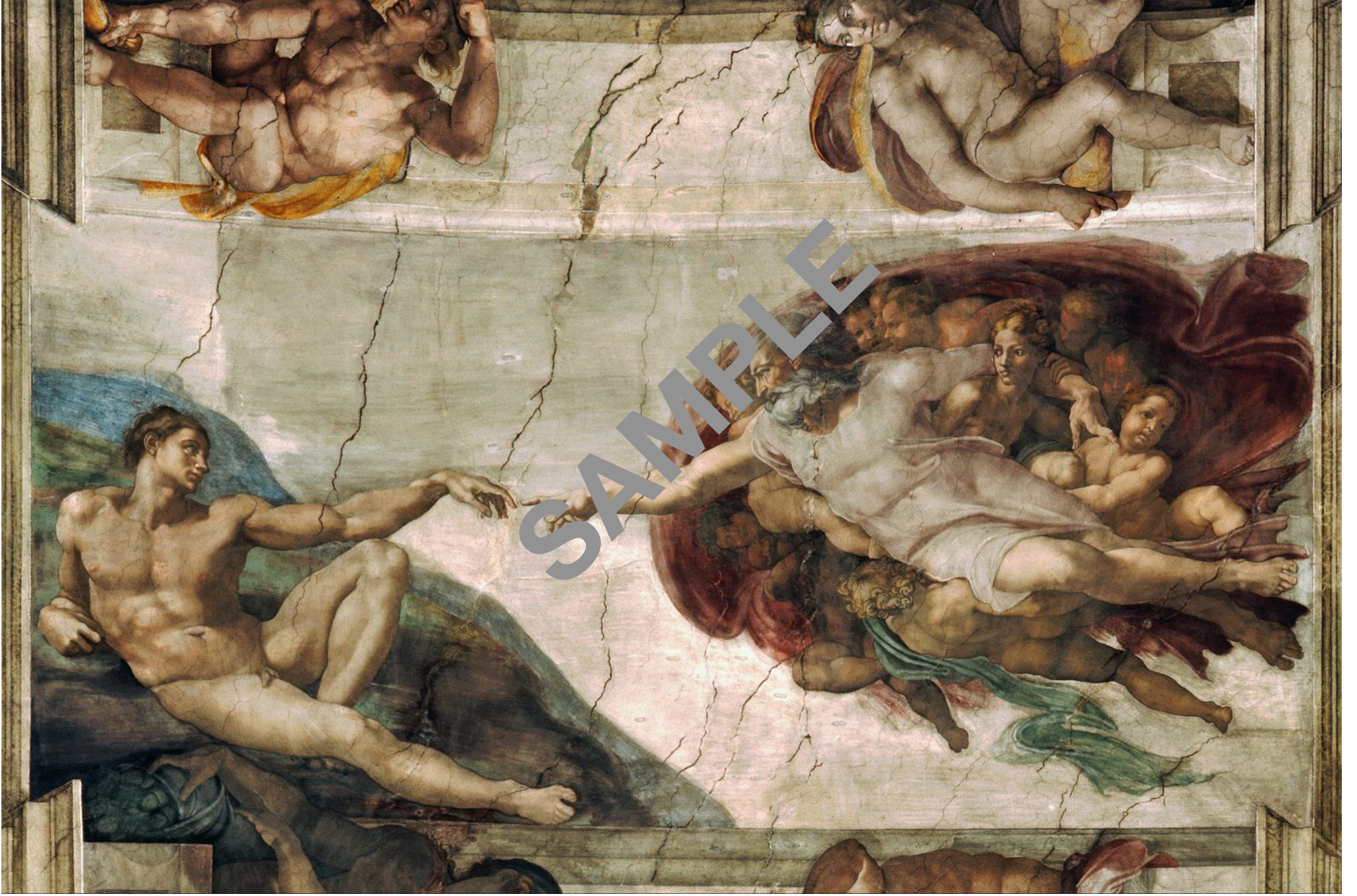
*So bring Him incense, gold, and myrrh,

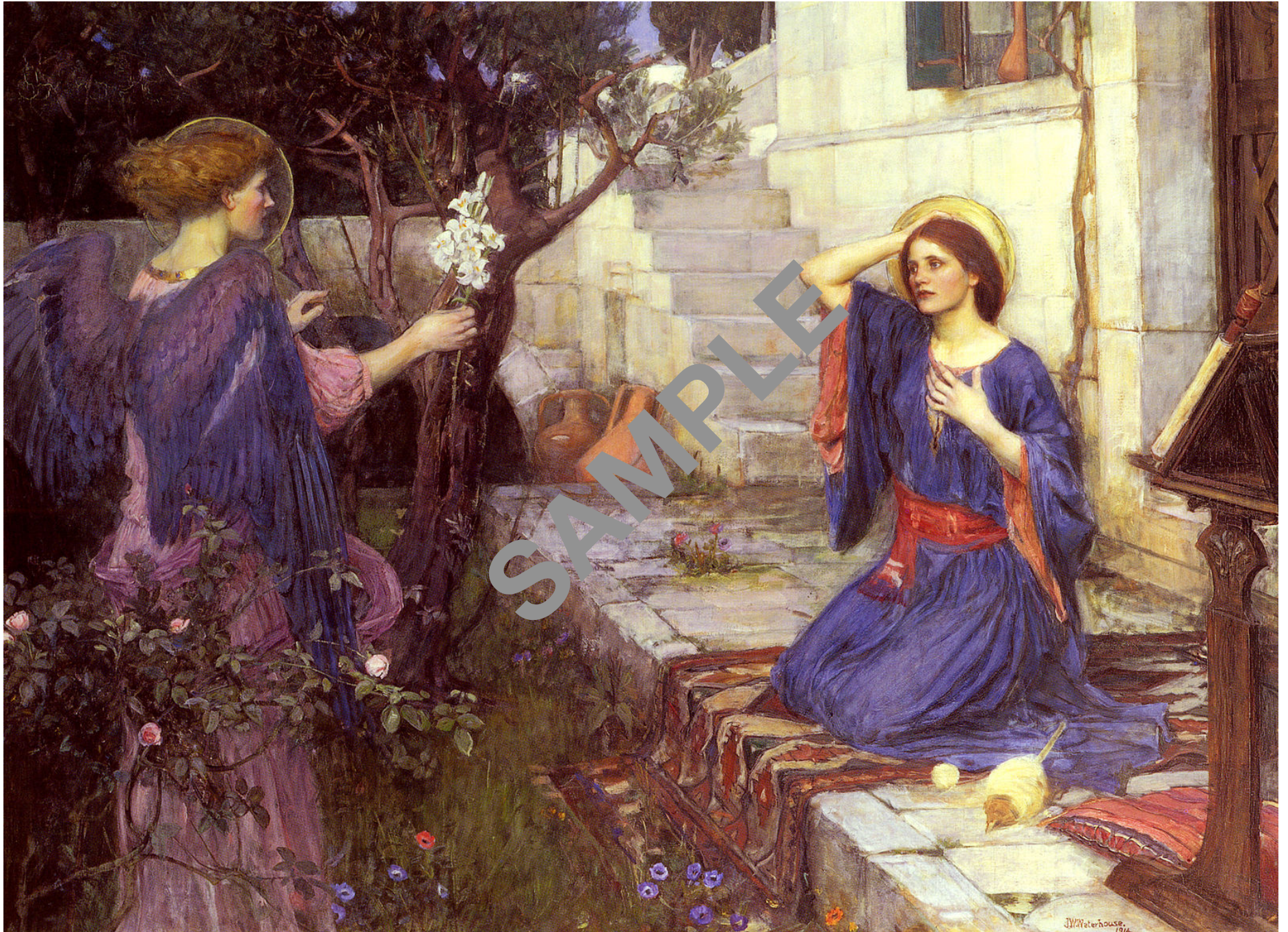
